SET

Context of Luke 5:1-6:16

Writing to set forth “an orderly account” of the extraordinary life of Jesus Christ, Luke continues his description of the Son of Man’s ministry in Galilee. Primarily these chapters record Christ’s calling of the twelve men who are the first identified disciples, and later as apostles. How amazing that this unlikely band of followers will become the human leaders of the worldwide entity known as the church! He also shows sovereign authority over nature, disease and defilement, sin and its consequences and religious tradition.

Keys to Text

Apostles: This term means “messengers, sent ones,” and is from the Greek word *apostoloi*. Luke reserves the term almost exclusively for the twelve disciples who were specifically called to a unique office of authority in Christ. The role of apostle involved a position of leadership and exclusive teaching authority in the early church. The New Testament were written by them or their close associates.

GO

Read Luke 5:1-11

And when he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, “Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch.” And Simon answered, “Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets.” And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus’ knees, saying, “Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord.” For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish that they had taken, and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, “Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men.” And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him. • What stood out to you in this passage? • Why did Peter refer to himself as a “sinful man”? • What was the result of the disciples following Jesus? • What does it mean for you to follow Jesus?

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Kentucky coach John Calipari apologized on Twitter after ESPN cameras caught him cursing at Terrence Jones near the end of the No. 12 Wildcats’ loss at Alabama. Calipari had drawn up a play to get Doron Lamb a shot attempt in the closing seconds of Kentucky’s 68-66 defeat. Rather than passing the ball to Lamb, Jones took the inbounds pass and put up his own last-second shot from half-court that went wide of the basket. Following the missed shot, Calipari cursed out his player for not executing the play. Jesus chose twelve ordinary men to lead the church and proclaim the gospel. These were men who struggled with self-control even as Jesus trained them. Self-control can be described as: Bringing my thoughts, words, actions and attitudes into constant obedience in order to benefit others. Self-control is listed among the fruit of the Spirit in Galatians 5:22-23. When we recognize a loss of self-control in our lives, we need to depend upon the Holy Spirit to produce this fruit. Remind yourself that one reason we fail in our doing is because we fail to grasp at a deep, heart level what Jesus has already done. We only start “doing better” as we increasingly focus on what Jesus has already done, not on what we must do.
